Climate You Change	Stewart Smith	Green Infrastructure and Teaching in Brampton Park	<p>Aims: To help residents of Newham find out how to grow the most food in the smallest space, sustainably and organically. Employing practical, reliable growing infrastructure and methods, we aim to show local people how this can save them money whilst lowering their carbon footprint, through reduced food miles, thus raising awareness of climate change.</p> <p>This will be achieved by adding additional infrastructure to the planned Brampton Park Community Garden project and teaching local residents during and after the construction phase in several widely spoken languages and sign language. We also aim to teach a more tactile experience class on sowing and transplanting for the local blind community.</p> <p>The additional infrastructure will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Durable planters which provide optimum growing conditions. These would use FSC certified wood. They would be heat treated to give them added durability, without chemicals. · A reliable rainwater harvesting system. Roman Road Primary School	Daniel Boakes	Roman Road Primary School - Growing Garden	<p>Roman Road Primary School is a maintained school located in East Ham. We are a two form entry school with around 370 children currently on roll. Children who attend are from a range of backgrounds and have different educational needs. Roman Road is aiming to have a home-grown, pesticide free, supernutritious fruit and vegetable garden to teach and encourage a more nutritious diet. The project will benefit children staff and parents at Roman Road. The approximately 300-400m² growing garden will be situated on the grounds of Roman Road Primary School. The project will include levelling out a portion of grassland in order to allow the placement of an allotment area and planting beds. Benefits of a Growing Garden Food growing can teach children about soil, nutrition, science and life cycles of the vegetables and the creatures attracted to the garden. A vegetable plot can raise children's awareness of the seasonal nature and the variety of food. A food growing project can allow staff, pupils, and parents to be involved. To provide a therapeutic space for children and young adults. Gardens are peaceful, healing spaces where many can find rest and respite from the world around them. 	Natasha Gossett	Unstructured play space in Brampton Park	<p>Aims and outcomes: To allow self directed unstructured play between groups of children of all ages Outcomes: Positive effect on wellbeing, many positive outcomes socially, emotionally and for communication and physical fitness that occur naturally in undirected play. Description: This project will provide the opportunity for self directed play between multi aged groups of children within an open and unused area of Brampton Park. It will provide the potential for connecting tarps, tarps and loose parts to play with. This may be a range of materials: wood, tyres, sticks, logs, crates, tins, sand, wood chips and various tools. This could benefit the many families that live around Brampton park. Forest groups, nature play groups and interested schools may also come to visit the space from surrounding areas. It meets all the priority areas: 1. It makes the area safer as more families will use this quiet corner of the park. 2. Children who get to play in nature become more attuned to it and take better care of it. 3. 	Shahina Begum	Urgent refurbishment and improvements needed in Barking recreational ground.	<p>Barking recreational ground on Barking Road is in need of a complete refurbishment. The small playground is worn out and unsafe for young children. The climbing frame, roundabout and swings are all damaged. This park serves many residents so first of all we need to increase the playground area as it is currently too small for the number of children who play there. The park itself is fairly big but most people come with children just to use the playground so we need to increase the size of this and I suggest gating the playground area to separate it from the open green space where others may be playing sports or having picnics. All the current playground equipment needs to be replaced with new safe and attractive equipment. This includes new and an increased number of infant and child swings. A nice big climbing frame with possibly two slides; one for infants and a larger one for older children. Also like many other playgrounds in the area, a zip line and seesaw would be lovely for all the children. Furthermore, the green space needs to be cleaned thoroughly and walkway/cycling path needs improving as currently parts are damaged making it difficult and unsafe to run/cycle on as many people also use the park for exercise. The park is currently used for fun fairs in summer, which is great but it could be used for other purposes too. For example, fireworks displays could be held here on special occasions such as bonfire night, Eid, Diwali and new years eve which could discourage others from doing it on the streets at unsociable hours, which is firstly extremely dangerous and also disruptive to infants, the elderly and animals. Parish of the Holy Trinity, East Ham	Susan Lucas	Growing Good Seeds: St Bart's Community Garden	<p>This project links with all 3 of the identified priorities for the East Ham Community Neighbourhood, 'A safer, cleaner and more accessible neighbourhood', 'Environment' and 'Parks and Open Spaces.' The project is to create a community garden in a small square of ground on Navarre Road, and a pleasant seating area around the tree on the corner of Navarre Road and Barking Road. The seating area will encourage shoppers, parents with children and more elderly residents to rest for a moment. The square will be divided into raised beds. Some of these will be 'edible' – growing herbs and soft fruit, and some will be seeded with native wildflowers, to attract bees. We hope we can encourage neighbours to pick the edible bits of the garden, providing fresh food in due season. In addition, we run a community café in St Bart's and are about to start a food pantry (food co-operative) – so some of the 'edible' bits of the garden would also end up as ingredients in the café offer, and as part of the pantry offer.</p>	On the St Bart's site in particular on the corner of Navarre Rd and Barking Rd (E6 3AQ)	5,000

Given our high levels of deprivation and need in the borough, I think every child deserves the right to access good quality books without a cost. 	Leah Mullen	Changing Places Toilet in Central Park Cafe	<p>I propose that we renovate the toilets in the cafe in Central Park to include a Changing Places facility. As this park is already such an important centre for our community, it makes sense to create facilities that allow everyone, including those with mobility difficulties to access the park. A Changing Places toilet has a changing bed, hoist, a toilet and sink at an accessible height, and enough room for a wheelchair user and carer to manoeuvre. A Changing Places toilet can be used by everyone – those with special needs and those without. Adding a Changing Places facility to the cafe will address two of our community priorities by helping to make East Ham's parks and open spaces more accessible. The toilets in the cafe are in need of repair and renovation anyway in order to meet the standard to which the cafe has been raised. Local residents who use wheelchairs would, with this new inclusive space, see Central Park as a welcoming and accessible space. 	Paro Kaur	Community Safety/Health and Well-being	I want to put forward this project because Community Safety is absolutely critical for all residents. As a resident of East Ham I want to live with less fear and more freedom which is vital for living a happier lifestyle. Knife crime and physical assaults on the streets is a serious and growing problem so I will tackle this problem by learning key survival skills, basic fundamentals, street intelligence and awareness from Sifu David Singh. The ultimate aim of this project is to be able to feel safer on the streets, improve health and wellbeing. This programme will bring people together and get us working together outside in local venues. We will not only come out for the weekly class, but as we grow in confidence, often form friendships as well as the continuation of using the local venues. This class also focuses on mental wellbeing as much as the physical, also dealing with issues such as domestic violence, bullying, bereavement, stress, anxiety and depression. Sifu David has taught women who have experienced domestic violence so he has an understanding of the issues concerning domestic violence, physical and mental abuse and the effects that it has on people. So by learning self defence and exercising, I know the benefits that this activity will have on people. As a former participant in Sifu David's Street Self Defence classes this project will produce effective, cognitive behavioural benefits, more positive response to physical challenges, greater autonomy, emotional stability, assertiveness and reduction of anxiety and depression. Newham Green Gym	Penny Evans	East Ham Nature Reserve enhancement for local residents	The project will benefit people in the whole of Newham, by increasing the amenity value of the open space, making it more attractive to visit. The addition of seating makes it accessible to people who have difficulty visiting at the moment. This is particularly important for older people, who may be lonely and experiencing mental health problems and would benefit from sitting in natural surroundings. Planting more wild flowers and bulbs improves the environment for people and would support pollinators like bees and butterflies, whose numbers have declined sharply. Reinstating the pond would create a new habitat, bringing in more wildlife. This would give more scope for educational activities. East Ham Nature Reserve is already an exceptional site for reptiles, with an exceptional population of slow worms and a good population of common lizards (Frog life criteria). The addition of water would definitely bring in frogs, toads and newts and possibly grass snakes, making it a very important site for reptiles and amphibians, not just in the local area but in Greater London. Bonny Downs Community Association (BDCA)	Jessica Craig	Grow Together, Be Together - Improving a Community Garden in East Ham	This project will improve a well-used eco-friendly Community Garden in East Ham. It will do this by running weekly garden maintenance workshops for people moving on from homelessness, referred by the charity NEWway. Participants in the workshops will learn new skills, and they will contribute to the community by helping to repair and maintain the garden, and rejuvenate it after Covid. Working with an experienced gardener, they will help make new signs and wildlife-friendly bird houses, bug hotels and ladybird towers that will entrance local children. The Community Garden is on the corner of Flanders Field (accessed via Melbourne Road or Wellington Road). It runs free school sessions, and gardening sessions and events for people of all ages and backgrounds, including annual celebrations for Eid, Diwali and Christmas. The food grown in the garden is shared among the volunteers and donated to the nearby Food Bank. This project covers gardening workshops for 12 homeless adults 8 hours a week for a year, in which they will make repairs and improvements to the garden. Successful participants can go on to paid work with NEWlife gardening social enterprise. The funding will also cover free Gardening Workshops for families on Fridays and Saturdays. Newham Community Project	Rozina Iqbal	Making East Ham Safer, Cleaner, and More Accessible	East Ham has an exceptionally high crime rate, almost double the crime rate in London. Our aims are to create a safer and cleaner district, create awareness of street crime by increasing community intelligence, implementing strategies to reduce crime rates, and developing community involvement and integration through this program. We will also make use of relevant existing services through signposting. We anticipate the outcomes will be to have a district with significantly reduced crime rates, safer neighbourhoods where residents are not in fear of themselves being hurt or their possessions being stolen, and a cleaner district. We also endeavour to enhance community engagement and community integration. To attain our aims and outcomes, we will create awareness to establish a safer district; we will design and distribute appropriate leaflets in various languages amongst the East Ham district residents, focusing mainly on busy areas; the town centre, local community areas, and community facilities. Following the initial awareness, we will construct relevant surveys for residents to complete in order to help identify high crime locations and distinguish other areas of street crime that need to be more targeted.
